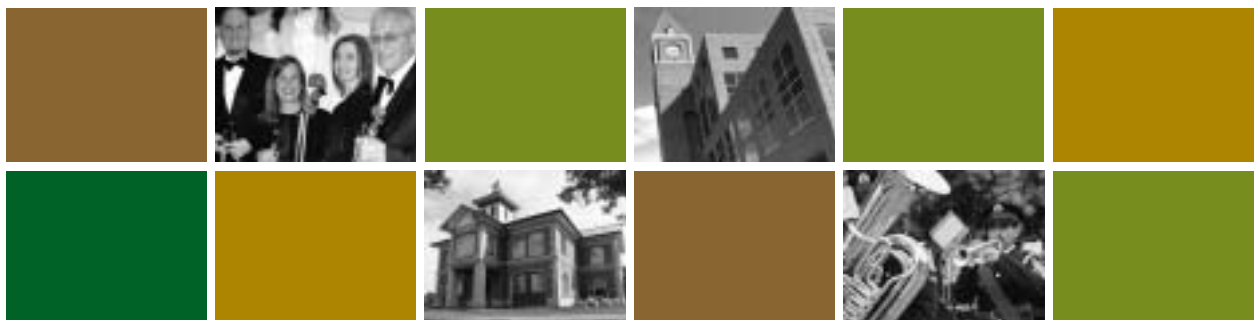

Putting Down Roots

The start-up phase of the BACF has gone extremely well. The purpose of a community foundation is to build endowment funds that generate annual, ongoing revenue that is distributed in the form of grants to charities. The BACF is proud to have been able to distribute over \$850,000 in grants on behalf of endowment fund holders and donors since 2003. As of December, 2004, the value of all endowments with the BACF was over \$1.7 million. This upward trend will continue, and the grants will continue to grow. The BACF is intent on establishing itself as a Brampton and area institution that will provide funding to worthy charities in perpetuity.

Unlike any other organization or charitable entity, a community foundation is unique. Its mandate, as determined and regulated by Canada Revenue Agency, is simple: to build capital endowment funds; invest and manage the monies; perform annual distributions to registered charities; and dedicate itself to fulfilling the charitable and philanthropic wishes of its fund holders and donors.

By granting only from the return on the invested monies, the BACF ensures that the initial donated capital is protected and preserved forever. The capital donation will always be available as a base for investment. This structure enables the BACF to claim with confidence that an endowed donation to the BACF is truly a *gift that will last forever*.

We are grateful for the trust placed in the BACF by our fund-holders, donors, and the community. We exist to perform donor and fund-holder service by supporting, through grants, qualified, worthy charitable organizations for generations to come.

Message from the Board Chair & Executive Director

2004 was a significant year in the development of Brampton and Area Community Foundation (BACF). The BACF has more than tripled its endowments from \$470,019 in February 2003 to \$977,661 in December 2003 then to \$1,745,557 in December 2004. With an 11.88% return (net of fees) since inception, these endowment monies are not only growing well, but they are also returning significant revenue for annual financial grants to qualified and worthy charities.

An updated, completely re-designed website was also important news for the BACF in 2004. The new website completes the public face of the organization by employing the design style and branding of the BACF in a manner consistent with other BACF literature and marketing materials. An easier to read and to use format, with significant technological improvements, enables the BACF to communicate more effectively with fund-holders, donors, grant recipients, and the community as a whole.

Both the number and size of grants continued to increase in 2004. The BACF was able to distribute over \$500,000 through sixteen separate grants to charitable organizations. We are very proud of this accomplishment in only our second full year of grant making.

2004 also marked the passing of the torch as the BACF's founding Chair, Robert Bell, welcomed new Chair, David Sharpe, to the role starting January 2005. Robert Bell will continue with the BACF as its past-Chair and remain actively involved at the Board and Committee levels.

With the organization well established and making a positive difference within the community, the BACF is poised now to make the next step. The immediate objective of the organization is to build endowments to \$5,000,000. At this level, the BACF will be able to make grants to charities totaling approximately \$250,000 every year from endowed resources alone. It is an ambitious goal, but one that is attainable. Brampton and area residents have already demonstrated their belief that the BACF is a smart, sensible vehicle through which to practice charitable giving. With endowments already approaching \$2,000,000, there is a will within the community to utilize the BACF to its fullest potential. We look forward to reaching the \$5,000,000 objective.

To our fund-holders, our donors, and our supporters, the BACF thanks you. Your foresight, generosity, and charitable spirit help those in need today and those who will be in need tomorrow.

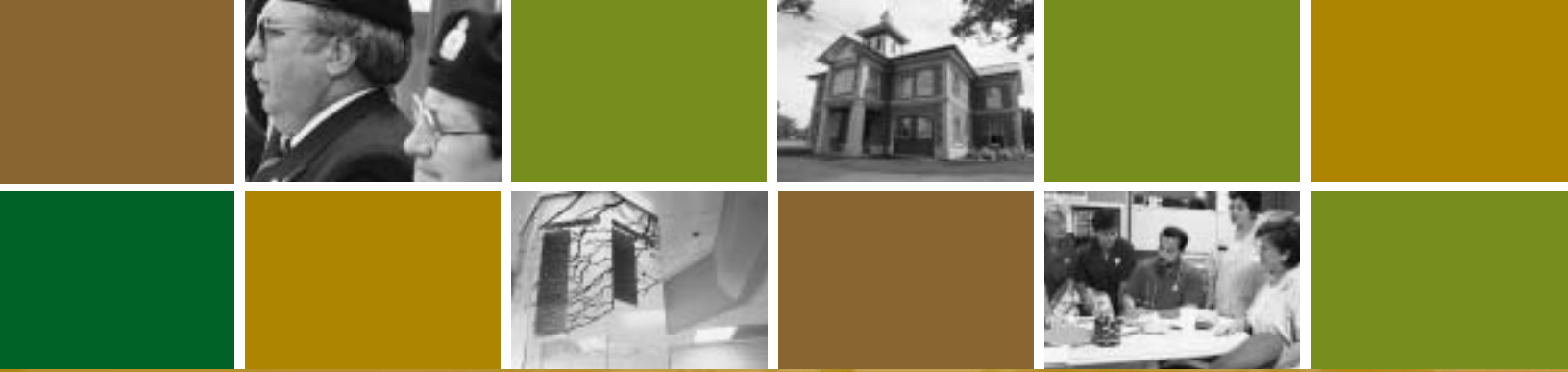

People Helping People – Community Services

Brampton/Caledon Community Living — \$1,700

Recognizing its clients' need for ongoing support, Brampton/Caledon Community Living established an endowment fund with the Foundation in March 2003. In partnership with its volunteers, their families, and the community, Community Living supports people with developmental disabilities and helps them to lead enriched and meaningful lives. The \$1,700 grant will enable Community Living to continue its respite and family services support and referral service, which connects individuals and families to available community programs.

Children's Aid Society of Peel — \$500

Since 1912, the Children's Aid Society has been making a difference in the lives of Peel Region's youth. The Society has assisted more than 16,000 children and 7,800 families. Today, thanks in part to its donors, the Society is able to provide support for the prevention of child abuse and neglect and to further skills in development and socialization throughout the community. Unfunded by the government, the Society's annual grant makes continued support for these programs possible.

St. Leonard's House (Peel) — \$20,000

The Rotary Club of Brampton has always held concern for those marginalized by society because of their past transgressions. To alleviate these concerns and change the future, the Rotary Club contributed \$20,000 to St. Leonard's House to purchase 60 more beds for the Rotary Resolve House in Peel. For men in transition, the Rotary Resolve House expansion furthers their opportunity to re-acclimate to society in a place of safety, belonging, dignity, nourishment, and education.

African Community Services of Peel — \$2,400

For eight years, African Community Services of Peel has been providing seniors' support programs to enhance their opportunities to participate in a range of activities. A \$2,400 gift from the Robert and Nancy Bell Fund went directly to the Seniors' Sewing Club project to encourage creativity and participation and engage newcomers in a productive enterprise in their new community.

John Howard Society of Peel-Halton — \$1,650

Founded on the belief that youth at risk do not have to live a life of crime, the John Howard Society is using the \$1,650 it received in 2004 to develop its Youth Referral Service. This service will make it possible for the Society to work with police and other service providers to provide meaningful interventions for referred youth and to address their involvement in crime. An investment in intervention now will give identified youth a second chance at a productive and meaningful future.

ARTS AND CULTURE

Peel Heritage Complex/Friends of the Peel Museum — \$1,500

Thanks to the generosity of donors Kathy and Chris Butcher, John and Teresa Coupland, Don and Nancy Crawford, and the Colony Ford Lincoln Sales Fund, senior members of our community are getting an opportunity to express themselves artistically. A \$1,500 grant made it possible for the Peel Heritage Complex and the Friends of the Peel Museum to offer the Young at HeART program, which leverages partnerships with service providers to enable local artists to visit care centres and provide seniors and the disabled with an opportunity to express themselves creatively in a fun and stimulating exchange.

Brampton Symphony Orchestra — \$6,000

Imagine a young musician struggling to play a violin, and an elderly statesman of the Brampton Symphony Orchestra string section coming to his aid and inspiring him to keep trying. For young musicians, this kind of mentorship is a reality thanks to a \$6,000 gift from the Lois and Max Rice Endowment Fund to fund the Brampton Symphony Orchestra's Strings for Youth program. The program enables Brampton youth to learn from, play with, and be inspired by the masters.

HEALTH SERVICES

William Osler Health Centre Foundation, Brampton — \$2,600

In 2002, Harry and Karen Lockwood established a donor-designated fund for the express purpose of creating a perpetual stream of revenue for the benefit of the Brampton hospital. In 2004, the Harry and Karen Lockwood Fund provided a gift of \$2,600 to the William Osler Health Centre for the ongoing development and services of the community hospital.

Epilepsy Brampton and Area — \$2,500

Epilepsy Brampton and Area understands that acceptance is challenging for children who are "different". That is why it's using the \$2,500 community fund grant supported by the Gail and Lou Duggan Family Fund, the William and Jean Lawrence Fund, the Kathryn and John Logan Family Fund, and the TD Canada Trust Fund to fund Kids on the Block, a puppet show designed to introduce differences to children. Students at Mayfield Secondary School present the show at local schools to promote understanding and awareness. This grant ensures that all schools in the Brampton area are aware of this opportunity for learning and sharing.

Jessie's Foundation for Music and Dance Therapy — \$2,000

Thanks to the generosity of the Art and Mabel Morrison Fund, Brampton children living with autism, down's syndrome, or any of a number of physical or mental difficulties will have the opportunity to enjoy music and dance that enhances their physical abilities.

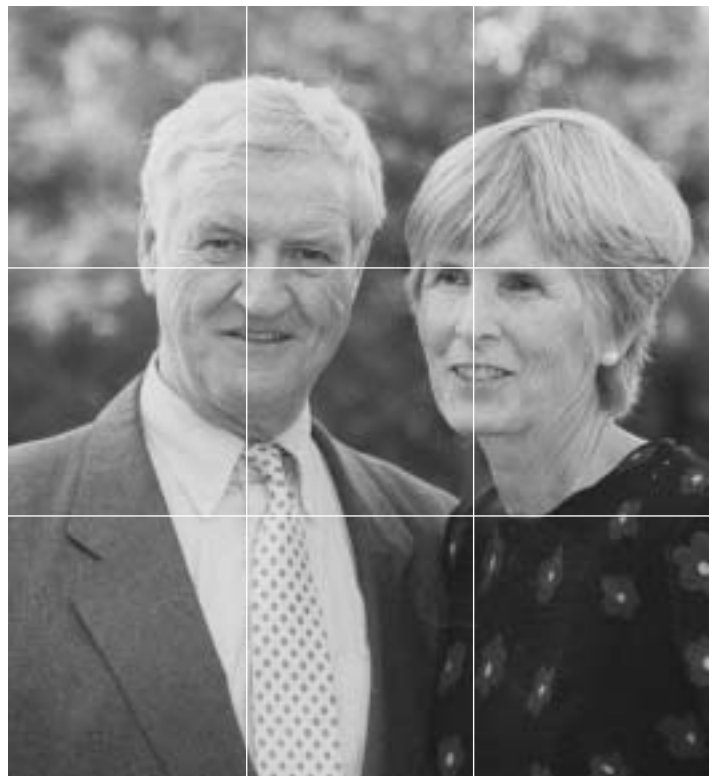
Marty and Mary Hughes

Marty Hughes is not only a fund-holder with the BACF, but he's also an integral part of the initial team that brought the dream of a community foundation for Brampton and the area to fruition.

From 1999 to December 2004, Marty gave his time, abilities, and professional expertise freely. His contributions as a director, executive committee member, and committee chair have helped the BACF attain the level of success it currently enjoys.

Marty and his wife, Mary, recognize that needs in the community are ongoing; and they feel strongly that the best way to address an ongoing need is with ongoing funding. An endowment fund through a community foundation exists for this sole purpose – to create a perpetual revenue stream that will benefit worthy charities.

Marty commented, "...when we came to the greater Brampton area in 1968, the old Town was approximately 35,000 and Bramalea, as part of the former Township of Chinguacousy, was 15,000. Now look at it. Brampton has been good to us; I have practiced here ever since; Mary worked in the Brampton Library; three of our children went to high school here. Now, it is time to share some of our treasure with the community and we are happy to do so".



Meet Some of Our Donors

Teresa Coupland

John and Teresa Coupland moved to Brampton in 1968 to begin their lives together and raise a family. Both worked hard to provide the best for their family and they were determined to achieve a level of success that would provide the security and prosperity that they sought for themselves and their three children. John worked for several years in the automotive sales industry. However, he had the entrepreneur's itch and knew he would not be satisfied until he was his own boss.

In the late 1970s, he started a business out of his basement that sold plastic caps and plugs to a variety of industries and trades. John recognized that a simple plastic cap, such as is used to cover and bind a couple of wires in a wall socket, was used everyday and everywhere in Canada and beyond. From a business perspective, it was the perfect product – simple, effective, and in constant demand. Success was now just around the corner. In 1986, their business and personal achievement was personified with the opening of the Caps 'n Plugs warehouse at 4 Baker Rd. in Brampton.

After all the hard work, John, Teresa, and their family were now able to enjoy life to the fullest. John was an avid classic car collector (as the photo will attest) and a huge Frank Sinatra fan. Teresa often comments that one of the highlights of John's life was playing in the Sinatra Open Golf Tournament.

Sadly, John passed away a few years ago. Teresa felt that a fitting tribute to John's memory and the Coupland name in Brampton would be the creation of the John and Teresa Coupland Family Fund at the BACF. As with other endowment funds at the BACF, the John and Teresa Coupland Family Fund exists to make charitable grants to worthy local charities. It is a Coupland family legacy that will last forever.



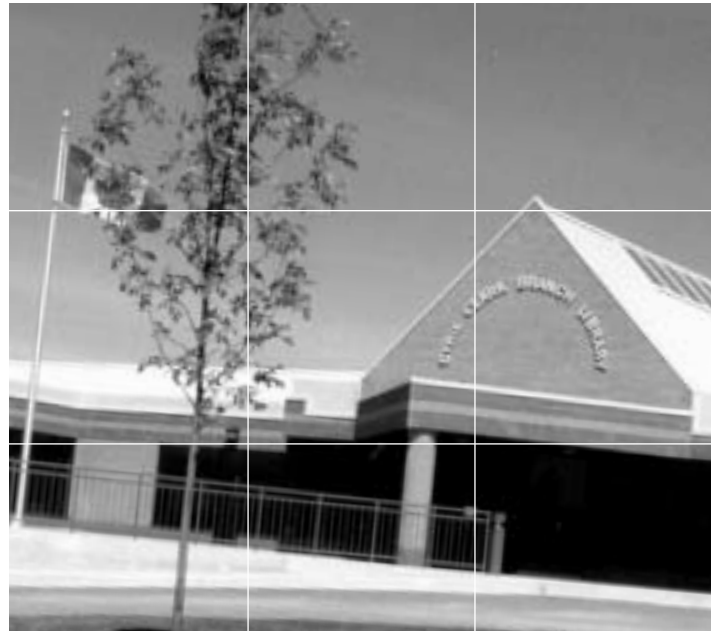
Meet Some of Our Donors

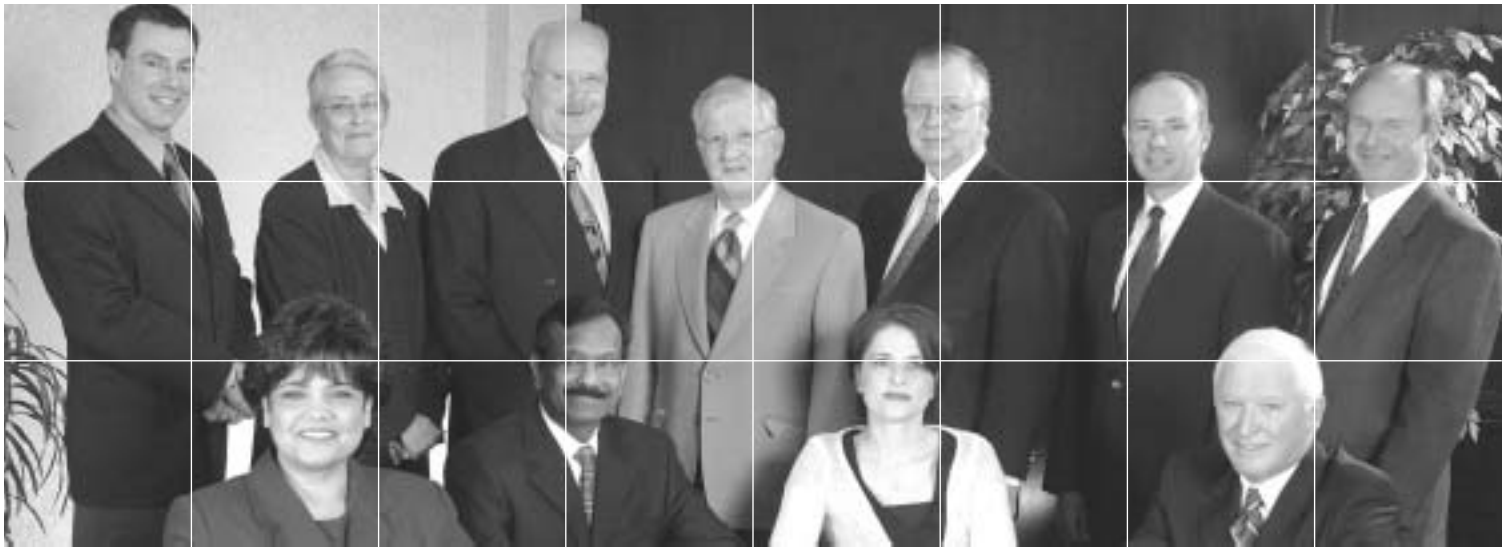
